Dear Mr. Attorney General:

Basic digital hygiene is essential to information security across the federal government. Every agency within the federal government must commit to improving its digital hygiene to strengthen our ability to detect, respond, mitigate, and prevent cyber incidents. The modernization of legacy IT is one way to improve an agency's digital hygiene.

The Modernizing Government Technology (MGT) Act was signed into law in December 2017 as part of the National Defense Authorization Act of 2018. The bill authorizes two types of funds for the purpose of modernizing the federal government's legacy IT. The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) recently issued implementation guidance for federal agencies.<sup>2</sup>

The MGT Act authorizes your agency to create an agency-specific working capital fund (WCF) for IT modernization, managed by the agency Chief Information Officer (CIO).<sup>3</sup> Money saved by upgrading or decommissioning legacy IT systems at the Department can be saved within this working capital fund for up to three years. These funds can be used to purchase new technology. OMB implementation guidance directed agencies to notify OMB by March 27, 2018, if the agency intends to establish a WCF in fiscal year 2018 and initiate the process of creating a new account for the WCF.

It is important for the CIO to have authority and control over the entire agency's information technology budget and operations. In addition, the Committee would like to ensure agency CIOs have the tools necessary to create and make use of working capital funds authorized by the *MGT Act*.

To assist the Committee's oversight of this issue, please provide answers to the following questions:

- 4. Does your agency have sufficient authority to transfer funds into this working capital fund?
  - a. Please identify the legal authority to transfer funds to this working capital fund.
  - b. If you believe the agency does not have sufficient transfer authority, please explain the basis for this determination and the legal impediments to utilizing the working capital fund.
- 5. Please explain how your agency plans to use this fund or other appropriated funds to procure emerging technologies, including artificial intelligence.

Provide the requested responses as soon as possible, but no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 30, 2018. An attachment to this letter provides additional instructions for responding to the Committee's request. Should your response necessitate production of classified documents or information, please provide those as an appendix to your response letter under separate cover.
