Dear Mr. Musk:

Committee Republicans continue to investigate whether U.S. government officials have participated in suppression and censorship of lawful speech in violation of the U.S. Constitution.¹ Reports continue to surface that social media companies acted on behest of government agencies and officials when removing, restricting, or disclaiming content. The American people and their elected representatives must know the extent to which their government has engaged in prohibited censorship to expose and prevent this unlawful conduct. We request documents and communications from your company to assist our investigation and to uncover any unconstitutional actions by government officials or agents working on their behalf.

The U.S. Constitution prohibits government actors from abridging the freedom of speech.² While private companies may choose to independently curate and moderate content based on their own independent policies, government action to pressure or direct a private company to suppress the speech of its citizens crosses a line. Private companies, like Twitter and Facebook, can qualify as state actors in limited circumstances, including "when the government compels the private entity to take a particular action."³ The government's ability to restrict the content of lawful speech is extremely limited, and restrictions on political speech and related opinions must be justified under the highest level of scrutiny.⁴ Attempts by government agents

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to require additional disclaimers or other information appended to original content would also be prohibited.⁵

Despite these clear constitutional limits on government action, reports continue to surface that government officials and agencies have conducted censorship campaigns involving social media platforms. Whether working through the Department of Homeland Security,⁶ the FBI,⁷ or other agencies, government officials should not tip the scale by urging social media platforms to disallow certain speech. A bedrock principle of our democracy is free speech. The government, in concert with social media, should not tell Americans what they can and cannot say online. The Biden Administration's penchant for censorship under the guise of suppressing "misinformation"⁸ raises questions as to whether individuals within the Administration compelled companies such as Twitter and Facebook to censor Americans.

To assist Committee Republicans in conducting oversight of allegations that government actors have sought to suppress speech on your platform, please provide the following documents and information no later than December 28, 2022:

- 1. All documents and communications related to any effort by government officials, whether federal, state, or local, to direct or encourage your company to suppress, restrict, or remove content on your platform, including but not limited to communications from government officials flagging particular content as objectionable;
- 2. All documents and communications related to the use of your platform in an official capacity by government agencies and/or officials, including but not limited to use of your platform by government agencies and/or officials to provide public or nonpublic forums to conduct public business or other official engagements;
- 3. All documents and communications related to enforcement of your platform's terms of service with respect to government agencies and/or officials using the platform.
