1	Mr. Benzine. We can go on the record.		
2	This is a deposition of Ms. Margaret Moore conducted by the House Select		
3	Subcommittee on the Coronavirus Pandemic under the authority granted to it by House		
4	Resolution 5 and the rules of the Committee on Oversight and Accountability.		
5	This deposition was requested by Chairman James Comer and Chairman Brad		
6	Wenstrup as part of the Committee on Oversight and Accountability and select		
7	subcommittee's oversight of the Federal Government's response to the coronavirus		
8	pandemic.		
9	Pursuant to House Resolution 5, the select subcommittee has wide-ranging		
10	jurisdiction, but specifically to investigate the origins of the coronavirus pandemic and		
11	executive branch policies, deliberations, decisions, activities, and internal and external		
12	communications related to the coronavirus pandemic.		
13	On September 30th, 2024, the Committee on Oversight and Accountability issued		
14	a subpoena for Ms. Moore to appear at a deposition today. I would like to introduce the		
15	subpoena as majority exhibit 1.		
16	[Moore Majority Exhibit No. 1		
17	was marked for identification.]		
18	Mr. Benzine. On October 1st, 2024, the Committee on Oversight and		
19	Accountability noticed today's deposition. I would like to introduce that notice as		
20	majority exhibit 2.		
21	[Moore Majority Exhibit No. 2		
22	was marked for identification.]		
23	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Can the witness please state her name and spell her last name for		
24	the record?		
25	The Witness. Margaret Moore, M-a-r-g-a-r-e-t M-o-o-r-e.		

1	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Thank you.			
2	Ms. Moore, my name is Mitch Benzine, and I am the staff director for the majority			
3	staff of the select subcommittee.			
4	Under the select subcommittee and Committee on Oversight and Accountability's			
5	rules, you are allowed to have an attorney present to advise you during this interview.			
6	Do you have an attorney representing you in a personal capacity present with you			
7	today?			
8	The Witness. Yes, I do.			
9	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Will counsel please identify themselves for the record?			
10	Mr. Vigen. William Vigen from Venable LLP.			
11	Mr. <u>Jacobs</u> . And Ronald Jacobs from Venable LLP.			
12	Mr. Benzine. For the record, starting with the majority staff, can the additional			
13	staff members please introduce themselves with their name, title, and affiliation?			
14	Mr. Spectre. Peter Spectre, professional staff member with the majority staff			
15	with the select subcommittee.			
16	Ms. <u>Brewer.</u> Madeline Brewer, counsel for the majority.			
17	Mr. Osterhues. Eric Osterhues, chief counsel for the majority.			
18	. , chief counsel for the minority.			
19	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Thank you.			
20	Ms. Moore, before we begin, I'd like to go over the ground rules for this			
21	deposition.			
22	The committee and select subcommittee will conduct today's deposition in			
23	accordance with the House of Representatives' regulations for the use of deposition			
24	authority. This regulation is incorporated verbatim into the rules of the Committee on			
25	Oversight and Accountability at Rule 15.			

1	The questioning will proceed in rounds. The majority will ask questions for an				
2	hour, and then the minority will have an opportunity to ask questions for an equal period				
3	of time if they choose.				
4	There will be one staff counsel per side asking the questions during each round.				
5	To the extent members have questions for the witness, they will be propounded during				
6	their side's respective rounds.				
7	Do you understand?				
8	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.				
9	Mr. <u>Benzine</u> . The clock will stop if the witness needs to confer with counsel.				
10	When counsel for the witness is speaking and when members are speaking during the				
11	opposing side's round of questions, we will alternate back and forth until there are no				
12	more questions.				
13	Do you understand?				
14	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.				
15	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> We ordinarily take a 5-minute break at the end of each hour, but if				
16	you need a break before that, please let us know.				
17	Do you understand?				
18	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.				
19	Mr. Benzine. There is a court reporter taking down everything I say and				
20	everything you say to make a written record of the deposition.				
21	For the record to be clear, please wait until the staffer questioning you finishes				
22	each question before you begin your answer, and the staffer will wait until you finish your				
23	response before proceeding to the next question.				
24	Further, to ensure the court reporter can properly record this interview, please				
25	speak clearly, concisely, and slowly.				

1	The court reporter cannot record nonverbal answers such as nodding or shaking		
2	your head, so it is important that you answer each question with an audible verbal		
3	answer.		
4	Do you understand?		
5	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
6	Mr. Benzine. As you have already seen, exhibits may be entered into the record.		
7	Majority exhibits will be identified numerically, and minority exhibits will be identified		
8	alphabetically.		
9	Do you understand?		
10	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
11	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> We want you to answer our questions in the most complete and		
12	truthful manner possible, so we will take our time. If you have any questions or do not		
13	fully understand the question, please let us know. We will attempt to clarify, add		
14	context to, or rephrase our questions.		
15	Do you understand?		
16	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
17	Mr. Benzine. If we ask about specific conversations or events in the past and you		
18	are unable to recall the exact words or details, you should testify to the substance of		
19	those conversations or events to the best of your recollection.		
20	If you recall only a part of a conversation or event, you should give us your best		
21	recollection of those events or parts of conversations that you do recall.		
22	Do you understand?		
23	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
24	Mr. Benzine. You are required by law to answer questions from Congress		
25	truthfully. This also applies to questions posed by congressional staff in this deposition.		

1	Do you understand?		
2	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
3	Mr. Benzine. If at any time you knowingly make false statements, you could be		
4	subject to criminal prosecution, including for perjury.		
5	Do you understand?		
6	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
7	Mr. Benzine. This includes both knowingly providing false testimony, but also		
8	stating that you do not recall or remember something when in fact you do.		
9	Do you understand?		
10	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
11	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Furthermore, you cannot tell half-truths or exclude information		
12	necessary to make statements accurate. You are required to provide all information		
13	that would make your response truthful. A deliberate failure to disclose information can		
14	constitute a false statement.		
15	Do you understand?		
16	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
17	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Is there any reason you are unable to provide truthful testimony in		
18	today's interview?		
19	The <u>Witness.</u> No.		
20	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> The Federal Rules of Evidence and Criminal and Civil Procedures		
21	are not applicable for today's deposition. Under the House deposition regulation, a		
22	witness' attorneys may instruct a witness to refuse to answer a question except may		
23	not instruct a witness to refuse to answer a question except to preserve a privilege. The		
24	House recognizes constitutionally based privileges and not necessarily those privileges		
25	derived from common law.		

1	Do you understand?		
2	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
3	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Finally, the contents of what we discuss in the deposition today is		
4	confidential under the House deposition regulation. Under the rules, the chairman and		
5	ranking member shall consult before any release of testimony, transcripts, or portions		
6	thereof. The select subcommittee is conducting this deposition, but this consultation		
7	would occur between Chairman Comer and Ranking Member Raskin.		
8	Do you understand?		
9	The <u>Witness.</u> Yes.		
10	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Do you have any other questions before we begin?		
11	The <u>Witness.</u> No.		
12	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Can the reporter please swear in the witness?		
13	The <u>Reporter.</u> Yes, sir.		
14	Ma'am, will you please raise your right hand?		
15	Do you solemnly declare and affirm under the penalty of perjury that the		
16	testimony you are about to give will be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the		
17	truth?		
18	The <u>Witness.</u> I do.		
19	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Thank you.		
20	EXAMINATION		
21	BY MR. BENZINE:		
22	Q Ms. Moore, during the COVID-19 pandemic, did you have any conversations		
23	with Dr. David Morens regarding his obligations pursuant to the Freedom of Information		
24	Act or document retention laws and policies?		
25	A On the advice of counsel, I assert my constitutional privilege under the Fifth		

1	Amendment and respectfully decline to answer the question.		
2	Q Thank you.		
3	Let the record reflect that Ms. Moore has invoked the Fifth Amendment right		
4	against self-incrimination.		
5	Ms. Moore, please be very clear, are you declining to answer the question put to		
6	you solely on the ground that you believe the answer will incriminate you?		
7	A On the advice of counsel, I assert my Fifth Amendment privilege and		
8	respectfully decline to answer the question.		
9	Q Ms. Moore, is it your intention to decline to answer all questions put to you		
10	today by the select subcommittee on the basis of the Fifth Amendment right against		
11	self-incrimination?		
12	A Yes.		
13	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Does the minority have any questions or wish to make a		
14	statement?		
15	. No, we don't.		
16	Mr. <u>Benzine.</u> Ms. Moore, pursuant to the terms of the subpoena, you are free to		
17	depart.		
18	And we can go off the record.		
19	[Whereupon, at 10:05 a.m., the deposition was concluded.]
