Dear Mr. Baker:

The House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform's Subcommittee on Military and Foreign Affairs is investigating significant gaps in the federal government's ability to monitor and track Science and Technology Agreement (STA) sub-agreements between U.S. federal agencies and foreign governments, particularly China. While STAs serve as established instruments of diplomatic cooperation and scientific exchange, entering into such agreements with adversarial nations poses acute risks to U.S. economic competitiveness and national security due to intellectual property theft and information access manipulation.¹ Accordingly, the Subcommittee respectfully requests that the Department of State Office of Inspector General conduct a comprehensive assessment of the Department's current capabilities and future needs to establish an effective process for tracking STA sub-agreements.

In a response to a previous letter, the State Department acknowledged that there is a tracking mechanism for sub-agreements; however, the determinations of which sub-agreements are reported is at the discretion of the agency that enters into the sub-agreement.² This process can result in underreporting sub-agreements to the Department of State if an agency incorrectly determines the significance of a sub-agreement. The lack of proper oversight and tracking of STA sub-agreements between federal agencies and foreign governments poses a grave risk to U.S. economic and national security, underscoring the need for a centralized tracking and management system for said sub-agreements. Specifically, we ask that your evaluation include STAs from January 31, 1979, to the present and:

1. Evaluate the Department of State's past practices in monitoring STA sub-agreements;
2. Examine the security vulnerabilities and documented consequences associated with insufficient monitoring of STA sub-agreements;

3. Assess the viability of a STA sub-agreement tracking program and mandatory reporting system with the Department's current resources;
4. Identify the financial and personnel requirements needed for the Department to implement an effective sub-agreement tracking system with mandatory reporting requirements; and
5. Assess the organizational changes necessary within the Department to establish a sub-agreement tracking program with compulsory sub-agreement reporting practices for agencies.

An independent review by your office would provide Congress and the public with a clear understanding of how the Department can manage this process going forward as well as identify the risks associated with a continuation of the status quo. This request complements the Committee's request to the Government Accountability Office (GAO), which is positioned to perform a multi-agency review. The distinct purpose of this request to State OIG is to provide the Committee with a deeper understanding of the internal capabilities and limitations within the Department of State as the governing body dedicated to monitoring STAs.


